The Waterfront Visioning project has completed: Initial Concept Development, Technical Advisory Committee Review, CED Review, and 95% of the Charrettes/Community Engagement /Business Outreach. THIs stage will be completed on May 9 at the Business Mixer. Upcoming milestones include Planning Commission/City Council Review and implementation.

In addition, staff is working on climate resilience planning partnerships focused on the waterfront including the California Governor's Office of Planning and Research Integrated Climate Adaptation and Resiliency Program, Adaptation Planning Grant to help prepare the Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Plan (CCRS) with the County's Contra Costa Sea Level Rise Coalition.

Multifamily Organics Pilot Program: prompted by Subcommittee feedback, Environmental Services and MDRR staff initiated a program to provide in-person organics recycling education to residents and property managers of multifamily developments in Pittsburg.

- Hosted March 2024 demonstrations and offered green kitchen pail at:
 - Beacon Villas (10 participants)
 - Columbia Manor (20 attendees)
- Up next: Mosaic Apartments

Adopt-a-Spot Program: also prompted by Subcommittee feedback, Environmental Services staff bolstered Adopt-a-Spot program efforts including recruitment of participants, online presence, and engagement with existing partners to encourage more frequent cleanups.

- 5 new participants in fiscal year 2023-2024 brining total to 15 adopters...
- Developing a system to track clean-ups completed this fiscal year and the volume of trash collected.

2024 Civic Pride Day Event: On April 20, 2024 the City hosted a community trash cleanup day at Highlands Elementary and Buchanan Park.

RE: Agenda Item No. 4: City of Pittsburg Wayfinding Signage Project

Background:

The Wayfinding Signage Project is underway and is intended to encourage economic investment and development in the City while directing community members and visitors to key economic destinations, parks, amenities, and attractions such as Old Town Pittsburg and the Pittsburg Marina.

The City, along with the landscape consulting firm "oliver john", worked to identify ideal locations for directional and informational wayfinding signage. The signage is intended to be strategically located throughout the City and aid in guiding residents and visitors to key attractions and destination points. Key destination points identified with this project include City Hall, Pittsburg Branch Court house, City Park, Pittsburg Marina, Marina Community Center, Old Town Pittsburg, Buchanan Park, and Los Medanos Community College. Guidance to these destinations formed the basis for drafting the attached draft Wayfinding Signage Exhibit.

Kick-off:

On April 8, 2024, the Wayfinding Signage Project began with a kick-off meeting to discuss the need and intent of the signage, followed by site visits to key points, observing the entry and exit points to the City. As part of the analysis of the City, gaps were identified in existing City wayfinding signage, as it is mostly outdated, and lacks conveyance to the City key economic drivers. Heavily trafficked routes throughout the City present a key opportunity to guide commuters, visitors, and community members to the City of Pittsburg's unique destinations.

The City of Pittsburg is one of the few cities in Contra Costa County with direct access to the waterfront. Its Old Town area is well distinguished with historical charm and has been a key focus area of City staff, community members, and appointed and elected officials alike to reinvigorate and reimagine this as a major commercial, economically prosperous, and pedestrian friendly district.

In tandem with City's Economic Development Strategic Plan, one of the main goals of the wayfinding signage project is to increase economic reinvestment, economic development, and pedestrian activity in Old Town Pittsburg and center on making Pittsburg a regional attraction for arts, marina activities, and sporting events. With the upcoming addition of the Dream Courts athletic facility and new hotels this wayfinding project will also help introduce visitors to additional amenities that Pittsburg has to offer (i.e. restaurants, parks, shopping, watersports, and fine dining).

Also, this project will help guide residents located in newer residential developments, such as San Marco, to visit Pittsburg's marina and waterfront and to further activate Downtown Pittsburg and the Pittsburg Marina into major economic corridors and help increase pedestrian activity and economic development.

As part of this project and one of the main deliverables is the draft wayfinding signage exhibit. This exhibit will guide City staff in the final installation of the signs. This wayfinding signage project is one of the City's first initiatives to create a more unique, identifiable, and accessible community. A well-designed wayfinding and signage program functions as the common thread throughout a visitors and residents experience to new areas in the City. Signage will be intentionally and strategically placed to guide residents and visitors to predetermined, key destinations. While an effective wayfinding program may go unnoticed, an ineffective program will almost certainly cause confusion and frustration.

City staff is requesting feedback from the Community and Economic Development Department Subcommittee Members on the proposed wayfinding signage exhibit, locations, and destination points proposed.



for the 2023-2031 Reporting Period - AP-23-0021 (GP)

Background:

As required by State Law, every City and County in California must prepare and submit an updated Housing Element to the State Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD). The City is currently within the 6th Cycle reporting period from 2023-2031.

As such, the Draft 6th Cycle Housing Element was released in the Spring of 2023 and several public meetings and workshops were held to publicize and receive comments. The City revised the Draft 6th Cycle Housing Element to address the comments received. This Draft 6th Cycle Housing Element was adopted by the City Council on May 22, 2023, and submitted to the HCD for review and comment.

HCD reviewed the Draft 6th Cycle Housing Element and had comments regarding the City's Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing initiatives and projected residential development during the 6th Cycle. Staff and our consultant DeNovo Planning has reviewed HCD's comments and has updated and incorporated the recommended changes and will be submitting the Revised Draft 6th Cycle Housing Element to HCD for final approval.

Next Steps/Required Approvals:

The 6th Cycle General Plan Update is scheduled for consideration by the Planning Commission on May 28, 2024, and by the City Council for readoption on June 17, 2024. Once the City Council readopts the Revised Draft 6th Cycle Housing Element, staff will submit the document to HCD for final certification.

Façade Improvement Grant Program

Since the launch of the program on February 1st, the program has received significant interest and inquiry from the business community. As of this writing, the City has received six complete applications form eligible business. Out of those six, three have been approved and have signed grant agreements with the City. Downtown/Marina Sign Program

The Downtown/Marina Sign Program was established in 2022 to help downtown and marina businesses by providing them with free signage for the exterior of their businesses. The businesses work with the City to pick out a bracket sign and sign blank to their liking. The City in return prints the sign, provides it to the businesses, and also provides the sign permit application packet with instructions, all at no cost to the business. To date, the City has provided 13 businesses with signage through this program. Some of the latest to receive a sign include the newly-opened Downtown Café and the Pittsburg Historical Society.

Pittsburg EATS Program

The City and its program partner, NorCal SBDC, are wrapping up their services with the first cohort through this program by collecting program documentation from the participants on their eligible grant expenses. NorCal SBDC will also provide the City with a program recap report that will be presented to City Council.

On April 26, the City invited the Pittsburg EATS cohort to participate in a ceremony where they received large checks to signify their \$10,000 grants, and they had their photographs taken to be used for promotional purposes of the program and of themselves. Those members of the cohort that were not in attendance will be visited by City staff to have their checks personally delivered to them and to have their photograph taken.
