Redaction Services RFP

- The California Public Records Act (PRA) provides for a right of access to public records and other information.
- Body worn camera technology has increased public dissemination of video and audio recordings of police interactions with the public.
- Current Police Department staffing levels are insufficient to manage volume of PRA requests relative to video redaction.







Redaction Services – Request for Proposals

- RFP Posted April 3, 2024

 - Budget of \$50,000/year (\$250,000 possible over 5 years)

- Only <u>1</u> proposal submitted, requirements met





What is Flock Safety?

Flock Safety cameras is a leased ALPR service for Law Enforcement, private HOA's and businesses.

- Currently, we have 16 License Plate Reader cameras throughout the city via Vigilant Systems.
 These cameras were purchased by the City; therefore we are responsible for the maintenance and yearly licensing. The benefit is we own the cameras, but the yearly costs associated with maintenance/repair are unknown.
- The Pittsburg Police Department is in the process of implementing 16 additional ALPR cameras throughout the city utilizing Flock Safety. These cameras are leased; therefore, Flock is responsible for the maintenance/upgrades so the city does not have to incur the unknown costs.

 On top of that, Economic Development will also be purchasing 16 Flock Safety ALPR cameras to be placed near shopping centers and new home developments expanding our network to 32 cameras.



City Hall Camera Project

- The police department is looking at bolstering the camera security system in and around City Hall. The police department has mapped out areas of importance which include: the payment center, the community development/planning center, council chambers, vehicle entry/exits, exchange zone, and all public areas within City Hall.
- The camera security system infrastructure has a total of 52 high resolution cameras, 42 of which will be placed inside City Hall, and 10 that will cover the exterior of the building.
- The cost of the project will be approximately \$50,000.

Use of Force:

The simulator enables officers to utilize the entire use of force spectrum, including the less-lethal options they carry, without the need for costly training cartridges, sprays, or impact munitions.



De-escalation:

The **RECON** 180 allows law enforcement officers to train for a wide range of de-escalation scenarios, helping them learn how to defuse tense situations and avoid the use of force.



Crisis Intervention:

From handling mental health crises and domestic disputes to active shooter situations, officers can hone their decision—making skills for better outcomes in the field.
